FURTHERING THE MISSION

A New & Improved MOMS Green

As far back as 2011, Sojourner House recognized the need for a dedicated and functional outdoor space for our families to play in and spend quality time together.

All those years ago, we built and opened MOMS Green—an outdoor play yard that became a favorite spot for our families to meet, play, and socialize. It offered a charming space and safe environment for families in recovery to connect and rebuild together.



MOMS Green quickly became a favorite spot over the years, taking on an even more significant role during the COVID-19 pandemic, when our community needed a space to connect at a healthy distance.

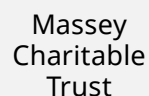
After 11 years of regular use—and after seeing firsthand the growing value of having an accessible outdoor space—we knew it was time for MOMS Green to receive some enhancements. We went to our long-time community partner, Homeless Children's Education Fund (HCEF), to create a plan to rebuild and refurbish the beautiful and healing outdoor space. Notably, HCEF was our partner when MOMS Green was first built.

Starting with a generous foundational mini-grant from HCEF of \$15,000, and further supported by in-kind donations, we raised the additional funds to carry the project from start to finish. Time and labor donated by volunteers also ensured that this vision became a reality.

On November 10, 2022, we cut the ribbon on the updated space. This fall and winter our families, friends, and MOMS community have enjoyed gathering together in this space, sharing meals, and even building a few snowmen. In the coming months, this space will be used for kids to participate in HCEF's after-school, cultural, and STEM programs. We're also excited to see families use the space to plant a sensory garden together.

These MOMS Green improvements represent what creativity and resourcefulness can do. We are grateful to our project partner, the Homeless Children's Education Fund, and to all who gave gifts to support this project.

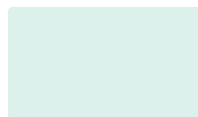
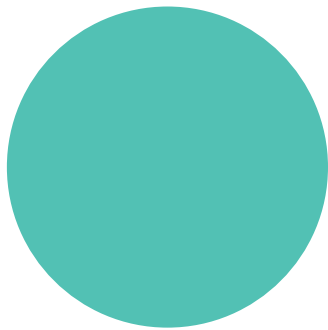
SEPTEMBER 23 Yoga in the Street

Building and Improving Our Diversity, Equity, and Inclusion Initiative



At Sojourner House, our mission is to serve some of the most vulnerable populations. We recognize that to ensure we're successfully carrying out our mission, we are responsible for examining and removing barriers that prevent or restrict access to care. This includes obstacles related to racial inequality that lead to disparities, particularly in the areas of healthcare and behavioral health.

Diversity, Equity, and Inclusion (DEI) is not a one-time initiative. It requires ongoing attention and needs to be incorporated into an organization's mission and principles. This is why Sojourner House and Sojourner MOMS DEI Initiative and Training is a critical part of our organization, and has been since our founding.

It's also not enough to create a safe, welcoming, respectful, and equitable environment for those we serve. Our employees deserve a space that meets these criteria, too. We cannot expect our team to provide quality care to those who turn to Sojourner House for help and hope unless they are also welcomed with resources and care. Therefore our DEI initiative embodies a culture where all clients and employees are welcomed and supported, regardless of ethnic or racial heritage, sexual orientation or gender identity, intellectual or physical disability, English language proficiency, or life experiences.

We also take pride in the fact that our team actively builds on existing DEI training year after year. In the last two years, Sojourner House employees, Sojourner House MOMS staff, and executive staff have participated in the following trainings:

- Education about minority mental health needs
